News

Robin Class have worked hard in all lessons covering the topics of Guy Fawkes and Remembrance Day. In English they talked about all the sounds fireworks make and created pictures using paint and glitter. They practiced their mark making skills in glitter sand using paintbrushes. In Maths they built tower rockets and used their number recognition and ordering skills to create numbered rockets. During Creative they painted poppies and listened to a short poem.

Pupils have continued to work on poems this week in English, thinking about Remembrance Day. They have developed their knowledge of number order to count objects and select the corresponding number. They were also using this knowledge to measure items and using the language of measurement. In Science, they have explored light sources, reflective materials and shadows. They have continued to work well on sharing their feeling and in geography explored landmarks around the world, then used building materials to create their own landmark. They worked hard on observational drawing in art.

In Science the pupils learnt about the sun being a light source and how to protect your eyes from the sun. The children enjoyed engaging in a sensory story of 'Can't you sleep little bear'. They discussed how little bear may be feeling in the story. In Maths we worked on shape and focused on how many sides a shape has. We also did work on number bonds to 10. In K & U we looked at a map and had to name the four countries and label them. In PE we practised our ball skills with throwing and catching. It's been a busy week.

Dragonfly Class had a lovely week continuing to explore light and symbolism in RE and Science, and they particularly enjoyed making Diva lamps. In English we have continued our work on poetry through 'Remembrance Poppy Poems', with lots of new vocabulary. The class are working hard to develop their knowledge of properties of shapes by classifying and grouping. They are continuing the theme of place value in number lessons. In DT we started to experiment with towers using marshmallows and spaghetti!

In Literacy we looked at how to set out an address to start writing our letters. In Numeracy we developed our understanding of column addition and used this to add up money to pay for items. In Science we used tuning forks and instruments to experiment with vibrations and how different they sound. In History we learned how the Anglo-Saxons influenced our place names we use today. We enjoyed working out in FitKidz, and we enjoyed working with Wombats and Sea Turtles in Forest School going on a puddle hunt.



Elephants have been learning about bones and their names in Science. We had fun making moving skeletons! In English, we have thought about what we need to make sentences – some have been quite silly! In Maths, we have practised adding using different methods. In our vocational lessons, we have been continuing with our sensory music topic and played percussion instruments to make up our own rhythms. In History we have learnt about the daily lives of Ancient Egyptians, thinking about their houses, food and jobs.

In English this week, some of us have completed our FS English Speaking and Listening assessments, the rest of us have been learning about formal and informal writing. In PSHCE/RSE we have been learning about healthy and unhealthy relationships. In ICT we have started our learning of how to create spreadsheets. We have been learning basic commands and cell referencing. We helped run the Stevenage inter-schools Boccia competition.

This week, L Class have continued development with written addition and subtraction skills. Students attending GCSE classes have been working on expanding brackets in expressions. In Science, the class concluded the unit on the digestive system with an end-of-unit quiz to assess knowledge. In K & U, they continued work on the country of Greece, looking at some different types of Greek food.

We had a lot of rain last week during lunchtimes. That meant that we had to spend some time indoors, where we used the library, attended film club, or some pupils enjoyed the large games, like Connect 4 or sharing stories.

When the weather was better, we ventured outside with our friends to play hide and seek or to go for a walk.

Governors started their termly round of board meetings. Last week the Safeguarding and Pupil Welfare Board met. They discussed all issues around wellbeing, safeguarding and pupil support. This week, the school's Resources Board will meet to look at everything linked to financing and resourcing.

In Friday's Task Master, we enjoyed creating a firework picture using anything except pens, paint and coloured pencils. Congratulations to Miss Rose's group who created the winning piece! This week in Science we have been learning the names of some of the major bones in our skeleton. In maths we continue to learn about measure and used non-standard units to accurately measure different objects. In Geography the class carried out experiments to represent different kinds of weathering.

In English, the class has been learning about how Kensuke lives alongside the orang-utans on the island. They have created a fantastic model island and have done some comprehension work about orang-utans. In Geography they have looked at different kinds of weathering and participated in some tasks to represent weathering. In Science they have been revisiting the internal organs, where these are located and what their role in the body is.

In Geography last week, we continued to learn about the continents, doing a labelling task to consolidate their learning. In RS, we started our topic on pilgrimages. Last week, we learnt about Buddhist pilgrimages and the Eight Great Places of worship. In Science, the class continued to learn about the body, focusing on the blood vessels in the body. In Maths, the class worked on counting in 2s. In English, we continued to read our class book, Wonder. In PSCHE, we did some more work on healthy eating – focusing on what food are in the different food groups.

We had a busy week with various activities, but the highlight was definitely the fun we had while taking class calendar photos. During our Science class, we studied the different roles and functions of blood that keep our bodies healthy. In Geography, we delved deeper into understanding maps and how to use the key to locate things. In History, we focused on the sequence of events that led to World War I and World War II, which was in line with our Remembrance assembly.

This week we have been learning about the history behind Remembrance Day in PSHE, and pupils have created some related crafts for a display. In English we looked at the features of war poetry and studied 'The Sentry' by Wilfred Owen. With Divali approaching, pupils have been working on some amazing rangoli pattern designs (see photo page)., while In Food Tech pupils made some very appetising loaded nachos - delicious!







Cyberbullying

What is Cyberbullying and online Harassment?

- Cyberbullying is any form of bullying which takes place online.
- This can be done over smartphones, tablets, online gaming, chat rooms, social media and more.
- Online harassment is the act of sending offensive, rude and insulting messages and being abusive.
- If someone purposefully keeps sending you offensive messages that make you feel scared, it could be illegal.



- Bullying someone whether online or offline is wrong.
- · It can badly affect their mental health.
- Harassing someone and/or sending malicious or threatening messages to someone repeatedly is ILLEGAL.
- If you are found to be cyberbullying someone, there could be criminal consequences.

How to cope with the effects of Cyberbullying

- You must not blame yourself. Noone deserves to treated cruely by anyone.
- It can make you feel very upset, alone and like noone will understand or help you.
- REMEMBER you are not alone and there are lots of people who can help you. Make sure you tell someone and do not try to deal with this on your own.

What to do if you are being cyberbullied

If someone is bullying you, here is what you can do to put a stop to it....get SMART.

5 creenshot any nasty messages.

My privacy settings.

Avoid talking to them any further.

Report the incident on whatever site you are using.

Talk to someone (parent, carer, teacher, friend or the police if necessary).

When to tell the Police

- If you are ever threatened with physical harm, being repeatedly harassed, being sent malicious messages.
- If it's not an immediate emergency, phone 101 or use our online webchat service.
- If it is an immediate emergency phone 999.
