PRIMARY



News

This week Robin Class have been learning about their sense of smell, they have enjoyed joining in with silly smelly songs and made smelly paint. In English they have been playing parachute games to support their listening and vocabulary skills. They have also been using water play to explore 'Five little ducks' and 'Rowrow your boat'. In Maths they have been playing skittles and exploring the marks we can make on a tally chart to see who has won the game. In Music the children have been continuing to explore different instruments.

This week in Monkey Class pupils continued to work well in PE, linking balancing and shapes with a peer. Thye have listened to the story 'Jack and the Beanstalk', discussing characters, objects and settings. They then used this knowledge to create their own story. In Maths, the children have sorted socks into pairs and started counting in 2s. They have also worked on 2 and 3 D shapes. In Science they discussed the importance of exercise, looking at different sports. They used this in PSHCE to look at teamwork, also in History, learning about 'Black sporting history' as part of Black History Month.

Alpaca Class have been enjoying looking at and describing signs of autumn. They have created a bank of ideas ready for some creative writing next week. In Maths the children practised their doubles, and in Science, they were learning about keeping clean. In PE the children worked hard on finding ways to move around the equipment and along benches.

In PHSCE they looked at what being a good friend means and identified ways they can be a good friend.

Dragonfly Class had a wonderful time celebrating harvest at our assembly – thank you for all your donations! We continued our work on habitats this week, and pupils are showing a keen interest in the topic, particularly in relation to climate change. In English we continued our work on non-chronological reports, creating sentences about our chosen mini beasts and choosing pictures to label. The class enjoyed a fantastic PE lesson with Mr Perrett and got quite competitive in their games, and they also enjoyed joining with Alpaca Class for some cross-curricular learning.

In Literacy we started to write our poems 'I like...' with rhyming words. In Numeracy we developed our understanding of division and length. In Science we learnt what exercise does to our body and how it affects us. In Creative we finished making our Hindu art. In PE we enjoyed moving our body in ballroom dance moves, especially the Cha Cha and really enjoyed working with Wombats and Sea Turtles in TaskMaster to make a tower out of spaghetti and marshmallows.

Our English story is getting exciting as Michael has now met Kensuke, the other human resident on the island. The pupils are showing good recall of the story so far and have worked on feelings experienced by the main characters. In Geography they have been learning about another European country, France, including traditional French food items. In Science they learnt how a mirror works and had fun reflecting a torch into the mirror to illuminate objects on the floor.

It has been another busy week in Hippos! In Geography we looked at how the environment may look in 2050 using different facts about the environment now. In History we talked about Anglo-Saxon Gods, their beliefs and superstitions, we learnt about some very strange superstitions and decided on what kind of Gods we would be. In PSHE we talked about Black History Month, we watched the Big Live Assembly and talked about Nicola Adams and how she got into boxing and problems she had to overcome in order to become a successful boxer.


In English, we finished our fortune cookies, which included our 'Precepts' that we learnt about the week before. We also continued to read 'Wonder'. In Science, the class continued to learn about colour and prisms. In Computing, we looked at cyberbullying, comparing it to face to face bullying. In History, we learnt about Black History Month, discussing why it is celebrated, and then students researched an influential Black person in society, for example Rosa Parks. In Geography, we did a map symbol scavenger hunt, and in History, we continued to do some work on Anglo-Saxon villages. In PE, we played some Curling.

This week we have been continuing with sequencing. We sequenced the story of 'The Gingerbread Man'. We also sequenced different things like how to make a jam sandwich, a cheese sandwich, how to get ready for a rainy day and how to make a snowman. We have continued reading our story 'Kensuke's Kingdom'. We acted out a scene from the story. We also created a storm-at-sea picture, using paint, sand and tissue paper. It was lots of fun. We matched shadows to the correct object and completed a quiz. Then we did a Science experiment using puppets and torches.

Another busy week has flown by. This week's highlights include an amazing lesson in Music (see some photos for the kids in action). In Food Tech' pupils made chocolate-chip cookies - they were popular enough for some parents to request the recipe - well done, guys (but where is my share?!!). In English, pupils are getting the sense that something dark is going to happen in 'The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas'. In Science, we have had fun matching the skeletal systems to the corresponding bones and a lot of requests for 'Dem Bones' - will sort that out in the coming week.



A couple of pupils have started up a Music-Dance Club, and some more pupils are planning their own clubs to run for and with friends. A lot of the pupils still enjoy going outside at lunchtimes, although the weather is starting to change. The huge Connect-Four game is a very popular indoor option in secondary at lunchtimes.


Our Governors are starting to plan their school visits, and the new Governors are starting to settle in. We will introduce them to you here in the newsletter next half term.





Cyberbullying

What is Cyberbullying and online Harassment?

- Cyberbullying is any form of bullying which takes place online.
- This can be done over smartphones, tablets, online gaming, chat rooms, social media and more.
- Online harassment is the act of sending offensive, rude and insulting messages and being abusive.
- If someone purposefully keeps sending you offensive messages that make you feel scared, it could be illegal.



- Bullying someone whether online or offline is wrong.
- · It can badly affect their mental health.
- Harassing someone and/or sending malicious or threatening messages to someone repeatedly is ILLEGAL.
- If you are found to be cyberbullying someone, there could be criminal consequences.

How to cope with the effects of Cyberbullying

- You must not blame yourself. Noone deserves to treated cruely by anyone.
- It can make you feel very upset, alone and like noone will understand or help you.
- REMEMBER you are not alone and there are lots of people who can help you. Make sure you tell someone and do not try to deal with this on your own.

What to do if you are being cyberbullied

If someone is bullying you, here is what you can do to put a stop to it....get SMART.

5 creenshot any nasty messages.

My privacy settings.

Avoid talking to them any further.

Report the incident on whatever site you are using.

Talk to someone (parent, carer, teacher, friend or the police if necessary).

When to tell the Police

- If you are ever threatened with physical harm, being repeatedly harassed, being sent malicious messages.
- If it's not an immediate emergency, phone 101 or use our online webchat service.
- If it is an immediate emergency phone 999.
